Poisoning is a leading cause of <u>emergency department visits</u> and <u>injury</u> <u>deaths</u> in the U.S. Most poisonings happen in the home from exposures to medicines or to common household products. All ages are at risk.

Babies and Toddlers

WHY ARE THEY AT RISK? Babies and toddlers do not know what is safe and what is dangerous. Their natural curiosity leads them to explore cabinets, purses, or drawers where harmful substances may be stored. They put things into the mouth—especially when something looks or smells like a familiar treat. And they mimic the actions of adults and older children around them. For example: if they see someone using a vaping device, they may try to put it in their mouth, too.

This age group relies on adults to create a safer environment where they can play and explore. The most important thing you can do is store all products UP and AWAY, out of sight and reach.

Early School Years

WHY ARE THEY AT RISK? As growing children experience increasing independence, they may encounter poisons in spaces without close adult supervision. They may lack the knowledge or skills to avoid harm from such potential poisons as cleaning products, medicines, pesticides, even outdoor poisons like plants, mushrooms, snakes, etc.

Adolescents (teens to early 20's)

WHY ARE THEY AT RISK? As they become more independent, adolescents begin using medicines, pesticides, cleaners, and other household chemical products on their own. They may also be exposed to substances of misuse like nicotine, cannabis, alcohol, and prescription drugs.

The brain is still growing and developing until our mid-20's. Introducing substances of misuse during this vulnerable time can result in lifelong health effects.

It's more important than ever for parents and caregivers to protect adolescents' health and safety by talking to them about the risks of using and misusing substances. As a parent, teacher, coach, or other adult who has a meaningful relationship with an adolescent, your influence is powerful. Research shows they really do listen to you!

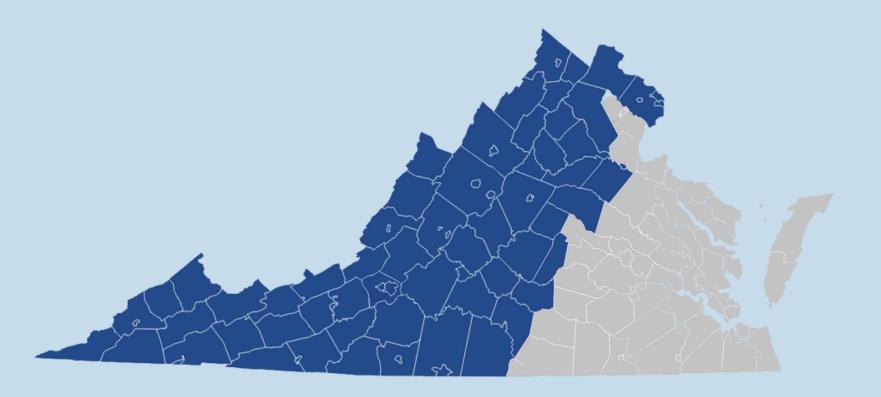
