Master of Public Health Degree Candidates Present Final Projects

From examining clinical outcomes in the hospital to exploring social determinants of health in the community, more than 30 graduating MPH Students showcased their analysis and recommendations to improve Health Outcomes and Health Equity at the PHS Poster Day.

All MPH students complete a final project known as an Integrative Learning Experience (ILE) that demonstrates synthesis of MPH knowledge and skills developed over a 42-credit hour curriculum. Students select an ILE topic in consultation with an MPH Program Faculty advisor appropriate to their educational and professional goals, based on their Program

care quality assessment, qualitative analysis, health impact analysis, and quantitative analysis.

Konstantine Khutsishvili and Liza Khutsishvili: Father -- Daughter Graduates in Public Health Sciences

<u>Editor's Note:</u> As another UVA graduation approaches, Public Health Sciences recognizes the important work its graduates do to improve health in the community, locally and around the globe. These two graduates have a unique history, a close bond, and great potential: Konstantine Khutsishvili, MPH (2018) and daughter, Liza Khutsishvili, a 2023 graduate with dual degrees in Global Public Health and Commerce.

In their native nation of Georgia, Konstantine Khutsishvili practiced medicine in Obstetrics and Gynecology, while his wife was a pediatrician. With hopes of a better life in the United States, Konstantine's wife applied and gained a position at UVA in clinical research. So, happily, they came to Charlottesville in 2006 when daughter Liza was just 5 years old.

Although unable to work as a physician in the US, Konstantine went into basic research at UVA and soon applied and was accepted to UVA's Master of Public Health program. Attending classes and working full-time, he earned his MPH with a concentration in health policy and ethics in August 2018. With his new degree, Konstantine was promoted in UVA's Histocompatibility (tissue typing/donor matching) Lab. "I learned more about US

Inspired by her father Konstantine's studies as well as both of her parents' commitment to the medical profession, Liza, a fourth year at UVA, graduates in May in both Global Public Health and Commerce, with a concentration in Information Technology. Liza laughs and adds, "It has been good to get advice about choosing professors and classes in public health. My parents also bake bread and bring it to me!"

This summer after graduation, Liza will apply both her knowledge of public health and technology skills to a humanitarian project with the Center for Global Health Equity in Tanzania. This fall, Liza will work for a year with the UVA Health Strategy Team (Jason Lineen, Chief Strategy Officer), and apply to medical school.

Two UVA MPH Students Receive Prestigious National Fellowships

Two students in the University of Virginia Master of Public Health Program have received prestigious national fellowships. Donavon Lea received the CDC Public Health Law Fellowship, and Abby Sacks accepted the HHS Health Communication Fellowship. Both outstanding students graduate in May 2023 with a Master of Public Health.

Donavon Lea's fellowship is sponsored by <u>CDC's Public</u> <u>Health Law Program</u> (PHLP) and <u>ChangeLab Solutions</u>. As the CDC describes, "the Public Health Law Fellowship offers fellows on-the-job training to prepare them for careers in public health law or policy. The program aims to strengthen the public health law workforce by increasing diversity within the field and preparing the next generation of public health law professionals to respond to critical issues. Fellows match with host sites at state, tribal, local, or territorial health departments, CDC, or other public health law organizations that support work in the public health law and policy fields."

From Virginia Beach, Virginia, Donavon graduated in spring of 2022 from UVA's Batten School majoring in Public Policy and Leadership with a minor in Bioethics. "After completing the fellowship, I plan to take a gap year before going to law school and becoming a lawyer." Donavon said.

National Grant for Research in Rural Health Disparities in the Treatment of Obesity and Related Chronic Diseases received \$3.37 million over five years for a grant to determine how to optimize digital obesity treatment for rural populations and address the obesity epidemic. The National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases (NIDDK) of the Institutes National of Health sponsored the grant. Dr. Krukowski is Co-Principal Investigator with Professor Delia West, PhD at the University of South Carolina's Arnold School of Public Health. Kelsie D. Kelly, PhD, MPH Presents STEAM-H Seminar at VSU– "Race policy and Health: It's not what you say, it's what you do."

"Race policy and Health: It's not what you say, it's what you do" is the title of the STEAM-H Seminar presented by Kelsie D. Kelly, PhD, MPH at Virginia State University on April 21. An alumna of VSU, this opportunity became a full circle moment in returning to her first home away from home. Dr. Kelly is now at the University of Virginia serving in multiple roles. She is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Public Health Sciences. School of Medicine: Global Public Health Studies Adviser; and Associate Dean for First year and transfer students and Director of the Peer Advisors program in the Office of African American Affairs.

In the seminar at VSU, Dr. Kelly discussed methods on how we can achieve health equity and reduce health disparities one person at a time. Part of her research includes using qualitative methods in public



housing communities in Charlottesville and Richmond together with community health workers to improve sleep and mental health. Dr. Kelly stated, "By using CBPR (Community-Based Participatory Research), we can learn how working with communities supports public health goals in efforts toward health equity using a resilience framework."

The STEAM-H Seminar is held weekly at <u>Virginia State</u> <u>University</u>, featuring speakers in Science, Technology, Agriculture, Engineering, Math, and Health.
